



Dear all,

Herewith an update on the progression of some of our products. Last year with the Covid-19 outbreak was challenging, but I think we still did pretty well.

1. Seha, the White rhino bull we were treating, sired a calf with Lucky, another White rhino female survivor. The calf is called Daniel.
2. We did translocate the 11 Wild dogs from RSA to Mozambique, where they are doing well and in fact has already had pups. A great success story.
3. We have tested several rhino transmitters in rhino in both RSA and Mozambique. Currently this project is ongoing as we are attempting to make the unit as small as possible, but battery capacity is a real problem. Seems like nobody worldwide invested in this research over the last 10 years.
4. We did become the official vets in the North of Kruger National Park in SA.
5. We also became the official vets for ANAC in Mozambique, which is their conservation authority.
6. We did support the Black rhino project in Ngorongoro in Tanzania, by delivering and installing 6 high-powered scopes on the Rim to monitor their Black rhino.
7. We employed an additional two local veterinarians in Mozambique, one on a permanent basis for STS, and one on a 2-year-contract to train so we can build capacity in the large country.



1. The Angola project did not realise due to political issues in the country.
2. The Black rhino breeding project is on hold, until we can source a majority of females. Eastern Cape Conservation wanted to sell us 10 Black rhino, however most were males. We are interested in a 70:30 or 80:20 female:male ratio, to maximise their breeding capacity. The reserve we have earmarked is triple fenced, and probably one of the best security properties in South Africa. We will therefore try and source Black rhino somewhere else.
